

JESUS ASKS: "DO YOU KNOW ME?" GREAT LENT 2012

Great Lent is the time of the year when pious Orthodox Christians worldwide participate in a journey. This journey is led by Christ Himself, taking us to meet Him through His miracles, His teachings, His Cross, Death and Resurrection. We experience this journey through hymnography, iconography, fasting, repentance and confession, the various worship services of Great Lent and – most importantly – through receiving Holy Communion, the medicine of immortality.



The First Sunday of Great Lent shows us that the Lord is All-Knowing. Christ knew the heart of the Apostle Nathaniel (cf. Jn. 1:43-51) and calls all people – disciples then and now – to repent. The moment we do, He releases us from sin, becoming sons and daughters of the Most High.

During the Second Sunday of Lent, the Church shows us that Christ is the "only Physician of our souls and bodies." He did not stop by curing the paralytic of his physical illness. The Lord cured him of his spiritual illness in a way that no one else could: Jesus forgave him of his sins. He freed the man from all forms of suffering – something every person can only pray for and trust in God's mercy.

Seeing Christ as the One who will help us lift our crosses on our personal Golgotha is the image that the Church conveys to us during the Third Sunday of Lent. He is the same Lord, though, who states that we cannot offer anything in exchange for our souls and that we should never be ashamed of Him in our lives, being proud of our faith in the Truth.

This year, the Fourth Sunday of Lent will be overshadowed by the great feast of the Annunciation of the Theotokos. This feast is when the Virgin Mary accepted God's call and became the Mother of God by conceiving Jesus Christ in her womb by the Holy Spirit. This should show us that obedience to God's commandments will guide us on the right path towards the Kingdom of God and that we do not live for ourselves but Christ lives in us (cf. Gal. 2:20).

Finally, on the Fifth Sunday of Lent we hear Christ's commands to His apostles: if one wants to become the greatest, they must become the least of all. His apostles thought the Kingdom that Christ preached about was a material kingdom, when the Kingdom of God is "not of this world".

All throughout Great Lent, Jesus is quietly asking: **Do you know Me? Have you** *made an effort* **to get to know Me? When you hear of Me, do you understand?** We might know about the doctrines of the Faith, prayers off by heart and what days to fast...but do we know how to love our brother and sister in Christ? If we see someone who is ill, hungry or poor, is compassion our first instinct?

These questions of faith—of *living our faith*—we must answer during Great Lent. Learning about Christ is not a stagnant event. It is a lifelong journey. Just as the Apostles, we too have the great opportunity to live His miracles, to be joyous in His resurrection and live with Him eternally. **The choice is ours.**

THE SERVICES OF GREAT LENT

Great Lent is a time of the year that Orthodox Christians go through a "spiritual workout" with the number of services that are held throughout the weeks leading up to Pascha. These services are put there to remind us that our mind should be more on prayer and less on things that might keep our mind away from prayer (be it sports, television, internet, etc.). There are essentially three new services introduced for Christians to pray:

- Great Compline Service: With more prayers and chants than a regular Compline, Great Compline is a service that is chanted every night in monasteries. At our Church, it was held on Clean Monday. Check the program of services to see if it will be chanted again.
- Liturgy of the Presanctified Gifts: Except for weekends, the Divine Liturgy is not celebrated during Great Lent. However, as Christians wanted to receive Communion as often as possible, this 90-minute special Vespers-style service was created for faithful. It is held every Wednesday during Lent at St. Demetrios Church, beginning at 7:00 p.m.
- Akathist Hymn to the Theotokos: Salutations services are held in honour of the Theotokos. They are chanted Friday nights for the first five weeks of Lent, culminating with the Akathist Hymn. They are held from 7:00 to 8:30 p.m.

The Annunciation of the Theotokos (Gr.
